

3. Public Comments — Facilitated by Vice-Chairwoman Watts - Informational/Standing item

Georganne Rogers of World Class Marketing Services, a subcontractor for Budget Mobile introduced her company and informed the Board that her company has assisted with the enrollment of approximately 370,000 Lifeline customers in the past 9 months. Ms. Rogers looks forward to continue outreach efforts and this important mission for the low income community.

Legislative Update – Nick Zanjani - CPUC- Office of Governmental Affairs – (10 minutes)
 Informational/Standing Item

Mr. Zanjani of the Office of Governmental Affairs (OGA) informed the Board the bill introduction deadline is February 27, 2015. Specific to the CPUC's jurisdiction for low-income, OGA is monitoring AB 88 (Gomez), this bill would exempt from sales and use taxes for the purchases made by IOUs for ESA program related equipment, which in turn would free up funds to purchase more ESA equipment. SB 350 (De Leon) is referred as the 50-50-50 goal and it sets a new set of objectives in clean energy, clean air and pollution reduction for 2030 and beyond. The objectives consist of increasing from 33% to 50% the procurement of electricity from renewable sources; to reduce today's petroleum in cars and truck by 8% to 50% and double the efficiency of existing buildings. SB 32 (Pavley) would require the state board to approve a statewide greenhouse gas emissions limit that is equivalent to 80% below the 1990 level to be achieved by 2050. OGA continues to monitor low-income related bills and will report back at the next LIOB meeting.

 Water Utilities' Current Issues – Rami Kahlon – Director, Division of Water and Audits Update/Informational/Standing Item

Rami Kahlon, Director of Division of Water and Audits reported on 4 topics, the low-income programs, water conservation, utility cost mapping project and water action plan. Mr. Kahlon reported that all large class A water utilities offer low-income bill assistance programs and that over 256,000 customers participate in these programs. He also noted that the participation rates leveled off in 2014, with a significant increase in 2013 as a result of data exchange efforts between the energy and water utilities. Data exchange activity occurs twice annually in March and September. California is in its 4th year of

drought conditions and as previously reported, on January 17, 2014 Governor Brown declared a Drought State of Emergency calling for a 20% voluntary reduction in water use. In July 2014, the State Water Resources Control Board put implemented mandatory restrictions. Monthly mandatory reporting began in August, 2014 for larger water suppliers that serve over 3,000 customers. As of December 2014, there was a 22% reduction in water use compared to December 2013. This is the first time the 20% target was achieved and California has seen reductions in monthly water.

Mr. Kahlon also shared details regarding the utility cost mapping project; he explained that this project is being conducted by the CPUC's policy and planning division. The goal of this project is to get an average of electric/gas/water bill and broadband availability by zip code and determine the impact of utility bills on low-income households, identify the areas in need of rate relief, increase conservation outreach and promote efficiency measures. Lastly, Mr. Kahlon mentioned that the Water Action Plan, adopted in 2005 and updated in 2010, was the last of the six objectives is to assist low income ratepayers, and within this project objective are four actionable action items, establish low income programs, increase penetration rates, work closely with the LIOB, and standardization of discounts across the utilities, which is still a work in progress.

The board asked how much education is being provided to educate the public about the severe drought.

Mr. Kahlon stated that there are a number of state agencies led by the Department of Water Resources have the "save our water campaign" that has been effect since last year. Also, a number of water agencies throughout the state, public and private are also promoting conservation measures and the conservation dollars that are allocated to the investor owned utilities has increased.

9. High Energy Audits - Remote Energy Audit Presentation Lisa Schmidt - HEA - Informational Item

Ms. Schmidt representing High Energy Audits (HEA) presented a study and analysis on the impact of low income energy efficiency programs, which she stated can increase the effectiveness of low-income energy efficiency programs by an order of magnitude (10x) by using existing technology, reducing the cost of program delivery and by increasing the measured energy reductions. HEA has worked with various communities on the peninsula, Alameda County, and other counties in the central valley area to provide software to community energy efficiency programs with very successful results. HEA's software analyzes residential energy use in a quick, accurate and cost effective way. Ms. Schmidt added that this is particularly applicable to low-income communities and HEA offers a way to use technology to increase the impact of low-income programs, adding that reducing energy use should not require a big investment. HEA's software was designed to remotely and accurately analyze a home's energy use and estimate the savings based on implementing cost-effective recommendations and to accurately track how much is being saved. Ms. Schmidt reported that using this technology, the Silicon Valley Energy Watch in San Jose ran a program that targeted low-income seniors living in single apartments, the program showed an average reduction of 10.2% in kWh and 12.2% average reduction in therms. Ms. Schmidt commented that California invested \$6B in smart-meters; however, users are not seeing the benefits of this technology. Ms. Schmidt strongly encourages a pilot of smart meter diagnosis and testing this theory out on low-income households. It was clarified that customers do not need to have internet service to participate. The smart meter data are taken from the user's meter and analysis is based on techniques that have been used on over 3,700 homes. These data can be used by experts to assist customers in accurately estimating home energy use.

Board Member Wimbley stated that CSD is in the process of implementing a weatherization program to examine different ways of accessing the energy consumption and this technology sounds like a promising prospect.

 ESAP and CARE Implementation (Board Members Castaneda, Pitcock, Wimbley, Watts and Lopez)

The ESAP and CARE Implementation Subcommittee met on February 4, 2015. Mr. Castaneda reported that the subcommittee reviewed the utility applications and the responses from stakeholders and participants. One of the issues raised was the assignment of activities to working groups. There was valuable input by EEC in terms of CPUC sanctioned working groups as opposed to LIOB. - c) Workforce Education and Training (Board Member Hernandez & Castaneda)
 The Workforce Education and Training met on November 5, 2014. Mr. Castaneda reported that WE&T discussed wages and employment as well as existing career ladders. Some of the discussion focused on the integration of a successful contractor working group in ESA and the Energy Upgrade California. There was mention of ongoing deliberations regarding the Energy Efficiency portfolio and inclusion of ESA contractors, which Mr. Castaneda added, would be well received as it impacts employment opportunities and work force training and job placement programs.
- d) Water Industry (Board Members Stephenson, Lopez and Castaneda) Water Industry met on December 16, 2014 and February 4, 2015. Mr. Stephenson reported that the energy companies reported on their water energy nexus and water measures contained in their applications. The February meeting was based on the various water issues that we are facing throughout the state. There was also discussion about the number of low income participants and concerns about the penetration rates.



Program Background

- Cool Centers provide a safe, cool place for customers in extreme climate areas where few public facilities are available to offer relief from the summer heat
- D.12-08-044 reinstated D.05-04-052 Ordering Paragraph 8, disallowing numerous Cool Center budget categories: "budgets shall not include costs for rent; utilities; insurance; janitorial services; other overhead costs; transportation (bus passes, vehicle rental, fuel costs); staffing at Cool Centers; or snacks and beverages."
 - D.12-08-044 noted PG&E and SDG&E leveraged partnerships with local government entities, specifically financial support is provided to city and county agencies to fund cooling centers, while SCE worked primarily with community based organizations and faith based organizations
 - 2015 Program will be consistent across all 3 IOUs with each leveraging local government entities



SCE Cool Center Program Overview

- SCE will partner with the local government administrators of county cool centers in lieu of contracting with individual centers as SCE has done in past years


