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Introduction

Southern California Edison Company (SCE) hereby submits its Low Income Assistance Programs Monthly Report for October 2008. This monthly report includes a brief narrative and quantitative tables (attached hereto), which describe the results of program activity during the month of October 2008 for SCE's low income assistance programs – the Low Income Energy Efficiency (LIEE) program, the California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE) program and the Cool Center program.

In D.06-12-038, the California Public Utilities Commission (Commission) approved the format of the accompanying tables, which were developed by consensus among the joint utilities (SCE, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E), Southern California Gas Company (SoCalGas) and San Diego Gas & Electric Company (SDG&E)), the Energy Division, and the Division of Ratepayer Advocates. The tables in this report conform to the monthly reporting tables that were attached to the email from the Energy Division on November 28, 2007.

All results reported in this monthly report update and supersede data provided in previous reports.

California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE) Program

As of October 31, 2008, a total of 1,100,223 customers were participating in the CARE program. Based on SCE's estimates of CARE-eligible customers and the income eligibility of 200% of federal poverty guidelines, SCE's current enrollment equates to a penetration rate of approximately 82%.

Outreach efforts and communications to SCE's in-language customers and under-penetrated areas continue to be a priority. SCE partners with the Equal Opportunity and Public Affairs Departments in CARE outreach activities that target SCE's hard-to-reach customer base. SCE has participated in many customer events through its Public Affairs department, wherein thousands of CARE applications are distributed to low-income customer populations throughout SCE's service territory.

In the month of October, SCE implemented a CARE/FERA enrollment campaign in SCE's service territory. The Annual City of Blythe Health, Safety and Education Fair was held in conjunction with the faith based organization St. Joan of Arc. SCE's CARE Program was a main sponsor of this event where roughly 3,000 Blythe community members were assisted with CARE enrollment information and nearly 400 CARE applications were disseminated. SCE provided in-language CARE applications, flyers and event posters. St. Joan of Arc was also able to provide a translator for the SCE CARE representative, and with the help of the translator, the SCE representative was also given the opportunity to hold a presentation on the CARE and FERA Programs for all of the 3,000 attendees.

Also in the month of October, SCE participated in several CARE/FERA public awareness campaigns throughout SCE's service territory through its partnership with

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SCE's Equal Opportunity and Public Affairs Departments. Three such events were the Upper San Gabriel Valley Municipal Water District Water Fest, The Monterey Park Green Fest, the Levitical Network Disaster Preparedness Fair, and the American Lung Association Healthy Air Walk. Thousands of CARE/FERA applications were disseminated at these events.

In addition, continued focus was placed on using existing CARE Capitation agencies to provide one-on-one assistance to SCE's hardest-to-reach customer base. SCE's CARE Program has experienced a significant increase in CARE enrollments through its Capitation agencies. SCE's CARE Program has also experienced a significant increase in the number and participation of Capitation agencies, which could be attributed to the quarterly training that was held for the Capitation agencies on October 15th. The training was a huge success. 15 Capitation agencies participated. Program and policy updates such as the Online Enrollment and Recertification process, Categorical Enrollment, and SCE and Capitation agency responsibilities to one another were covered. The training concluded with a productive round table discussion of Capitation agency best practices in increasing CARE enrollment.

SCE continues to include a CARE enrollment application in the Welcome Kit that is sent to residents requesting new service or transfers of service. In 2008, as of October 31, 20,955 customers were enrolled in CARE as a result of this Welcome Kit.

In October 2007, SCE sent out approximately 50,000 bilingual direct mailers, which included a CARE enrollment application, to targeted customers not on the CARE rate. Through October 31, 2008, SCE received 2,406 enrollment applications resulting in 1,493 new enrollments and 540 recertifications.

In December 2007, SCE sent out approximately 193,000 bilingual direct mailers, which included a CARE enrollment application, targeting customers who have received a Final Call notice. Through October 31, 2008, SCE received 6,589 enrollment applications resulting in 5,268 new enrollments and 649 recertifications.

In January 2008, SCE sent out approximately 280,000 bilingual direct mailers, which included a CARE enrollment application, to targeted customers not on the CARE rate. Through October 31, 2008, SCE received 9,451 enrollment applications resulting in 6,808 new enrollments and 1,088 recertifications.

In February 2008, SCE sent out approximately 87,000 direct mail letters to customers who dropped off the CARE rate between December 31, 2006 and December 31, 2007 due to failure to respond to recertification requests. As of October 31, SCE received 13,303 enrollment applications resulting in 8,295 new enrollments and 3,035 recertifications.

Additionally, in June 2008, SCE included the CARE enrollment applications in non-CARE customers' bills as part of the annual CARE solicitation. As of October 31, 2008, 29,583 applications have been received, resulting in 22,693 new enrollments and 3,330 recertifications.

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In July 2008, SCE sent out approximately 85,000 direct mail letters to customers who dropped from the CARE rate between May 31, 2007 and May 31, 2008 as a result of non-response to recertification requests. As of October 31, 2008, 10,364 applications have been received, resulting in 6,932 new enrollments and 1,557 recertifications.

In July 2008, SCE also sent out approximately 280,000 bilingual direct mailers to targeted customers not on the CARE rate. As of October 31, 2008, 9,673 applications have been received, resulting in 6,832 new enrollments and 1,153 recertifications.

In September 2008, SCE sent out approximately 280,000 bilingual direct mailers to targeted customers not on the CARE rate. As of October 31, 2008, 7,704 applications have been received, resulting in 5,241 enrollments and 1,106 recertifications.

Finally, SCE, as well as PG&E, SDG&E and SoCalGas, are working with the Energy Division to assist the Commission in its efforts to comply with SB 580. Through this SB 580 pilot program, the joint utilities will facilitate the enrollment of Women, Infants, Children (WIC) participants onto the CARE rate.

Low Income Energy Efficiency (LIEE) Program

SCE continues to strengthen delivery of comprehensive services to its low income customers. SCE contracts directly with an experienced and informed network of providers, including Community Based Organizations (CBOs) and private contractors. SCE also continues to implement LIEE as a leveraging vehicle with CBOs who deliver similar services through the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) administered by the California State Department of Community Services. For instance, SCE provides LIHEAP agencies with refrigerators, at no cost, for installation into a joint LIEE/LIHEAP home. This leveraging approach maximizes the budgets of both the LIEE and LIHEAP programs in order effectively to serve as many customers as possible.

SCE also continues to competitively bid the purchase of energy-efficient appliances. By purchasing appliances in bulk, SCE is able to obtain low prices on equipment and exercise a level of control over inventory that may not otherwise be possible.

Cool Center Program

SCE's Cool Center Program provides low-income, senior, and disabled residents safe, air-conditioned, facilities they can visit during peak hours of the summer months in lieu of running their own cooling devices at home. Cool Centers are located in communities in extreme climate areas where they are most effective to offer relief from the heat. Cool Centers also provide a place where customers can learn more about SCE's low-income and energy efficiency programs, energy conservation, and other available community programs.

SCE's Cool Center operations concluded on October 15, 2008. In 2008, 12 Cool Centers operated in the communities of Blythe, Hesperia, Highgrove, Joshua Tree, Landers, Palm Springs, Perris, Porterville, Rubidoux, San Bernardino, and San Jacinto.

Conclusion

SCE appreciates this opportunity to provide the Commission with updated information about the successes SCE has achieved in its LIEE, CARE and Cool Center programs.
