1.2. Whole Neighborhood Approach Evaluation

1.2.1. Provide a summary of the geographic and customer segmentation strategy employed, (i.e. tools and analysis used to segment “neighborhoods,” how neighborhoods are segmented and how this information is communicated to the contractor/CBO).

On April 16, 2010, SCE partnered with the city of Carson, along with numerous community organizations, faith-based groups, small businesses, and residential customers during an African American Community Forum. The forum provided information about SCE’s programs and services available to residents by helping create, renew, and strengthen strategic relationships between African American communities and SCE through networking and ongoing partnerships. The agenda included three comprehensive panel discussions in which SCE President John Fielder participated as a guest speaker. The three panels included topics related to the Economic Assistance Campaign, Payment Assistance, Income-Qualified Programs, Residential Programs, Advanced Technologies (i.e. plug-in electric vehicles, Smart Meters, and other emerging technologies), and discussions on community and customer programs such as grants and scholarship opportunities, Diverse Business Enterprise, Direct Install and Rate Shift. Closing remarks were given by SCE Director of Energy Efficiency Gene Rodrigues. Overall, the forum provided a platform to disseminate information and secure networking opportunities within the city of Carson.

On April 29, 2010, SCE participated in the 7th Annual Community Assistance Program Resource Fair with one of its local service providers, AnotherWay, in the city of Fontana. Representatives from over 100 local community assistance organizations

were present and provided free resources, referrals and information related to the following: community services, counseling services, health services, housing and rental programs, legal services, day care, pre-school and Head Start, senior programs, disabilities programs, shelter and transitional housing services, among others. SCE and AnotherWay set up a booth and provided LIEE information to over 100 customers and/or organizations in bringing program awareness to the surrounding communities.

LIEE, CARE, and SCE's Payment Services are currently in the process of partnering with local Authorized Payment Agencies (APAs) which will offer customers the option of paying their bills in person. The strategy would be to set up booths, during the summer months, in high traffic APAs to promote and enroll customers in the Income Qualified Programs (IQPs) offered by SCE.

Throughout the month of April 2010, SCE promoted the IQPs and other SCE programs at various community Earth Day events within SCE's services territories. Over 35 community events were held within the cities of Long Beach, Santa Monica, Yucca Valley, Barstow, Huntington Beach, Covina, Carson, Costa Mesa, Diamond Bar, and Hawthorne. Over 4,900 customers interacted with SCE and events marketing personnel and were able to receive information on LIEE and energy efficiency in general.

1.3. LIEE Customer Outreach and Enrollment Update

1.3.1. Provide a summary of the LIEE Program outreach and enrollment strategies deployed this month.

On April 14, 2010, SCE attended the Non-Profit Executives Network (NEN) board meeting to present the LIEE services along with CARE/FERA to over 20 local non-profit organizations servicing low income communities and customers with disabilities throughout SCE's service territory. Key attendees included individuals from various organizations, such as United Way, Goodwill, community hospitals, regional centers, Mustard Seed Tutorial Center, Aflac, Inland Temporary Homes, Latino Health Collaborative, Inland Empire Led Resource Development Collaborative, Verizon, and San Bernardino County Capacity Building Consortium. The purpose of the presentation was to inform NEN members of SCE's IQPs and discuss opportunities to increase awareness of IQPs to the low income communities touched by the members' organizations. Numerous organizations expressed interest in partnering with SCE and invited the IQP team to participate in various planned local events, such as Goodwill's Job Fair, 3rd Annual Community Thank You Event, Inland Regional Center's Parent Resource Fair, and The Jesse Turner Center Community Assistance 7th Annual Resource Fair. SCE will be setting up booths at the events to distribute program information and create on-line enrollments for interested customers.

SCE targeted approximately 32,000 CARE customers through the use of automated outbound calls. The campaign identified customers who may be eligible to receive LIEE services throughout the surrounding cities of the San Gabriel Valley within Los Angeles County. The automated outbound call asked various questions regarding a resident's household size and current income. The campaign successfully produced a 6.5%

eligible response rate. The success of the campaign will allow LIEE to continue to implement automated outbound calls through the 2010 program year.

SCE targeted approximately 114,000 CARE customers who had registered on SCE's website as a result of an e-mail blast to customers to promote and encourage participation in LIEE. Approximately 20,300 customers opened the email and 17% of the customers clicked on the 'Apply Now' feature, which generated over 2,000 leads.

In the months of April through June 2010, SCE will be launching the Economic Assistance Campaign promoting income-qualified programs along with options of payment extensions and arrangements to help customers during these financially difficult times. The campaign will begin distributing company-wide press releases and marketing to customers through various media outlets. To increase program awareness within SCE's service territories, direct mailers will be sent to certain customers based on criteria, such as whether the a customer has recently received a final call notice and has not enrolled in LIEE.

SCE continues to conduct an outbound calling effort that began in early August 2009. The effort targeted customers who did not successfully complete the enrollment process for various reasons. The intent of the ongoing effort is to continue to communicate with all customers who may have previously expressed interest in the EMA program and possibly reinstate those leads. Over 7,000 leads have been reinstated and referred out to EMA program agencies through the outbound calling effort since August 2009.

1.4. Leveraging Success Evaluation, Including CSD

- 1.4.1.** Please provide a status of the leveraging effort with CSD.
What new steps or programs have been implemented?
What was the result in terms of new enrollments?

For the past several years, SCE has provided refrigerators to contractors at no cost to the LIHEAP program for installation through the LIHEAP program. SCE is expanding this practice to all appliances offered through its EMA program. SCE believes this approach will enable contractors to utilize measures and services from both the LIHEAP and EMA programs to better serve SCE's customers. SCE continues to work with the Department of Community Services Development, service contractors, and the Commission in efforts to successfully leverage EMA and LIHEAP services.

1.5. Workforce Education & Training

- 1.5.1.** Please summarize efforts to improve and expand LIEE workforce education and training. Describe steps taken to hire and train low income workers and how such efforts differ from prior program years.

In Decision 07-12-051, the Commission stated that "(t)he LIEE portion of the statewide strategic plan should include specific training strategies for reaching disadvantaged communities." SCE's contractors, and particularly community-based organizations (CBOs), are situated in low income and disadvantaged communities and provide jobs

within these communities. Currently, these organizations provide over 800 jobs that support SCE's LIEE program.

During the 2010 program year, SCE facilitated 7 Home Assessment Training workshops, which provided training to agency outreach staff on the policies and procedures related to home assessment. The two day training workshop included comprehensive instructions on income documentation, customer and measure eligibility and customer service. As a result of the Home Assessment Training workshops, 122 new jobs for assessors were created to support SCE's LIEE program.

2.2. Outreach

2.2.1. Discuss utility outreach activities and those undertaken by third parties on the utility's behalf.

SCE continues to include a CARE enrollment application in the Welcome Kit that is sent to residents requesting new service or transfers of service. As of April 30, 2010, 9,972 customers were enrolled in CARE as a result of the Welcome Kit.

In March 2010, SCE also sent out approximately 280,000 bilingual direct mailers, which included a CARE enrollment application, to targeted customers not on the CARE rate. As of April 30, 2010, 11,363 applications have been received resulting in 8,268 new enrollments and 993 recertifications.

SCE partnered with East West Bank to display and disseminate CARE applications to eligible customers in East West Bank and Desert Community Bank branches. CARE applications are currently available in 53 branches throughout the counties of San Bernardino, Los Angeles, and Orange.

SCE’s Customer Communications Organization continued to use the online form at www.sce.com in the call centers to enroll customers on the CARE program directly over the phone. In April 2010, 8,066 customers were enrolled; 29,534 were enrolled year-to-date.

CARE and FERA outreach efforts and communications to SCE’s in-language and under-penetrated areas continue to be a priority. SCE’s CARE/FERA programs partner with internal departments such as Equal Opportunity, Local Public Affairs, Consumer Affairs, Customer Experience Management, Corporate Communications Community Involvement, Speakers Bureau, Business Solutions, Mobile Energy Unit, employee volunteer-based affinity groups, as well as external organizations such as the Long Beach Housing Authority, the City of Long Beach’s Neighborhood Services Bureau and various chambers, foundations, faith-based and community-based organizations (FBOs and CBOs), in outreach activities that target SCE’s hard-to-reach customer base.

During April 2010, SCE’s CARE/FERA programs had a presence at 56 outreach events through these partnerships, wherein thousands of CARE applications were distributed to potentially eligible customer populations throughout SCE’s service area (see table below). At many of these events, eligible customers had the opportunity to enroll or recertify for CARE via the real time online enrollment form at www.sce.com and learn about the programs directly from a CARE/FERA subject matter expert. Such events provided SCE with the opportunity to uphold a presence in the community, continue to educate the public about the programs, and enroll eligible customers. Upholding this presence in the community is hugely important as the economic climate continues to impact SCE’s customers—bringing a newly eligible customer base.

In an effort to sustain and expand partnerships within internal departments, SCE's IQPs held the second biannual "Outreach Summit" on April 20, 2010. Participants included members from SCE departments who engage in outreach: employee volunteer groups (affinity groups), Energy Efficiency, the phone center, Local Public Affairs, Consumer Affairs, Customer Experience Management, Corporate Communications, Community Involvement, Speakers Bureau, Business Solutions, and the Mobile Energy Unit. The purpose was to share outreach activities and identify efforts where different departments can partner together, leverage resources, and integrate messages to ensure that SCE's economic assistance message and programs reach all who can benefit from them. As a result of the summit, CARE/FERA management will be presenting at the next affinity group collective meeting to explore opportunities to partner on outreach efforts and to maximize the potential resources the groups can provide for volunteer and in-language support. The next summit is scheduled for October 2010.

As part of a faith-based initiative, SCE's Income Qualified Programs signed a purchase order with WBC Enterprises, lead by Pastor Mark Whitlock, a CAP member and key leader in the African American community. The purchase order will fund four outreach events during 2010 within the African American community in an effort to enroll customers in the CARE/FERA and EMA programs, as well as establish capitation contracts with faith-based organizations. The first of the four events was held on January 30, 2010 at the City of Refuge in Gardena.

The first event marked the joining of three major religious denominations within the African American community:

- Bishop Noel Jones of City of Refuge Church;
- Bishop Charles Blake of Church of God in Christ; and
- Bishop T. Larry Kirkland of the western region of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Together the above three Bishops represent over 13 million parishioners.

Over 4,000 people turned out for the "Day of Opportunity" on January 30, 2010. Thousands of CARE applications were disseminated and approximately 200 CARE applications were completed by customers on site.

The CARE/FERA Capitation Fee Project team continues its efforts to re-engage existing capitation partners while strategically registering additional contractors to overcome enrollment barriers, including language, culture, and special needs, as a means of enrolling the hardest to reach customers. Due to these efforts, the Capitation Fee Project continues to show increased enrollments from agencies that had been previously inactive.

On April 16, 2010, CARE/FERA management participated in a community forum in the city of Carson with the purpose of sharing information about SCE's programs and services available to community organizations, faith-based groups, small businesses, and residential customers. CARE/FERA management was able to create, renew, strengthen, and leverage strategic relationships with the organizations present to assist and better serve African American communities and customers experiencing tough economic challenges by introducing these organizations to SCE's IQPs (CARE, FERA, EMA) and the Capitation Fee Project. Groups in attendance were encouraged to apply for participation in SCE's Capitation Fee Program.

In support of its initiative to enroll hard-to-reach SCE customers and to leverage partnerships with agencies that have built trusting relationships with customers in their neighborhoods, CARE program management registered the following organizations as SCE capitation contractors:

- Special Service for Groups - Tongan Comm. Svc. Ctr.;
- Community Settlement Association (CSA); and
- Young Nak Outreach & Transformation Foundation (YNOT Foundation).

CARE/FERA management continued to work with agencies to develop creative outreach approaches. Capitation agencies are provided information and support to pursue alternative outreach activities that leverage their existing business strengths, including partnering with businesses and organizations in key locations, developing public forums in which to conduct outreach, and conducting outreach in conjunction with community events that have a high probability of attracting new eligible customer populations.

Current campaign strategies and efforts included the following:

- Partnered with school districts to leverage data related to categorical enrollment opportunities provided by the National Free and Reduced Lunch Program and other information to reach eligible school families while providing schools with revenue through the Capitation Fee Program;
- Leveraged events sponsored by communities, such as food distributions and cultural celebrations, to reach eligible populations that may be eligible to enroll in the CARE program;
- Partnered with SCE personnel to leverage existing SCE partnerships with faith-based organizations (FBOs), community-based organizations (CBOs), and local governments;
- Partnered with public entities to leverage existing relationships with businesses, FBOs, and CBOs to reach eligible customers through existing municipal channels;
- Leveraged existing channels to develop creative approaches for contractors to conduct CARE/FERA outreach, including food and clothing distribution events, employment information workshops, farmers' markets, faith and community based publications, school events, and community fairs; and
- In conjunction with an energy efficiency integrated project, CARE program management completed implementation of CARE program outreach at six retail stores where CARE/FERA program information was provided to customers by sales associates. Plans to expand this model are under consideration.

2.2.2. Describe the efforts taken to reach and coordinate the CARE program with other related low income programs to reach eligible customers.

SCE enrolled new CARE customers through the Energy Assistance Fund program, a program which provides utility payment assistance through voluntary customer and employee donations.

The CARE program is coordinated with other low income programs such as LIEE and LIHEAP. Each month, LIEE measure recipients are automatically enrolled in CARE and LIHEAP payment recipients are automatically enrolled in CARE quarterly. In the month of April 2010, 395 LIEE measure recipients were enrolled in CARE. In March 2010, 492 customers who received a payment through LIHEAP were enrolled in CARE.

The CARE program continued to integrate its efforts and messaging with the EMA program at all outreach events, communications, and marketing campaigns.

2.2.3. Recertification Complaints

SCE received one recertification complaint in April 2010. A customer was removed from the CARE rate from August 2009 through February 2010 due to failure to recertify. The customer thought he had recertified online, however, there was no record of the transaction. The account was placed back on the CARE rate on February 26, 2010, but was not retroactively rebilled. Payment arrangements were made and HEAP information was provided to assist the customer with the higher bills as a result of falling off the CARE rate.

3. 2009 SCE Cool Center Program Summary

3.1. Introduction

In the extreme climate areas of SCE's service territory, the ability to find relief from the heat has had a major impact on the comfort and health, particularly for SCE's low income, elderly, and special-needs customers. SCE's Cool Center Program (Program) contracts with service providers to deliver services to customers located in extremely hot climate areas where public facilities may not be easily accessible to offer relief from the heat during the hot summer months.

3.2. Background

The Cool Center Program originated in 2001 to provide a target population of low income, senior, and special-needs SCE customers in hot climates, safe air-conditioned facilities they could visit during peak hours of the summer months to benefit from the following:

- By reducing usage of cooling devices at home by visiting a Cool Center, SCE customers could potentially save energy and money;
- At the Cool Center, visitors learned about SCE low income and energy efficiency programs and received information about energy efficiency and conservation;
- Since SCE customers used less energy by visiting a Cool Center, it helped the environment because less electricity had to be generated with fossil fuels; and
- By visiting a Cool Center, SCE customers could reduce the potential for individual heat-related problems due to health or age-related conditions.

3.3. Program Activities

Locations

In 2009, SCE utilized nine contractors to operate 16 Cool Centers located in the hottest areas of SCE's service territories which are considered to be in San Bernardino and Riverside counties and the San Joaquin Valley. Cool Centers generally are municipal community and senior centers, as well as facilities operated by FBOs and CBOs. Specific Cool Center locations included the following:

San Bernardino County

1. Hesperia
2. Highland
3. Joshua Tree
4. Landers
5. San Bernardino (2 Cool Centers)

Riverside County

1. Blythe
2. Highgrove
3. Moreno Valley
4. Palm Springs
5. Perris
6. Rubidoux
7. San Jacinto

San Joaquin Valley

1. Hanford
2. Visalia.

Operations

The Program operated from June 1, 2009 through October 15, 2009.

Contractors operated Cool Centers under the following criteria:

- Cool Centers were open a minimum of 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday;
- Visitors without available transportation were provided transportation to and from the Cool Centers and contractors typically provided this transportation through bus passes;

- Contractors were requested to provide a Cool Center location in their buildings that was comfortable and conducive to gathering groups of people for an extended period of time during the day;
- Contractors provided activities to make a visit more entertaining (i.e. crafts, games, reading materials, and movies);
- Visitors received refreshments that consisted of snack-type foods and beverages;
- During the day, a brief workshop was held where Cool Center on-site staff presented visitors with information on (1) the purpose of the Cool Center, (2) what SCE low income and other community programs were available and how to enroll in them, and (3) how energy efficiency and conservation practices benefit them; and
- It is estimated that 30,000 visitors attended Cool Centers in 2009.

Outreach

In 2009, SCE assisted Cool Center contractors by providing outreach materials standardized in a format to project a consistent image among all Cool Centers as follows:

- A four-foot by six-foot banner was developed to hang outside each Cool Center site;
- A template for a flyer allowed a contractor to customize it to announce each Cool Center location; and
- A template for a flyer allowed a contractor to customize it to announce Cool Center events.

Individual contractors promoted their respective Cool Centers both with the flyers referenced above, as well as media advertising. Media included newspaper ads and broadcasts from a radio station at the Cool Center location in Blythe.

3.4. Program Expenditures

SCE utilized \$437,790 of a budget of \$777,000 in 2009. The variance was due to SCE administrative labor not hired as expected and expenses less than budgeted by SCE support organizations and Cool Center contractors. Contractors were reimbursed for approved direct material expenses and indirect overhead expenses, allocated to each Cool Center, upon receipt of acceptable supporting documentation.

3.5. Program Evaluation

In 2009, a study was conducted by a consultant to evaluate the effectiveness and efficiency of the Cool Center Program. The final report is pending.

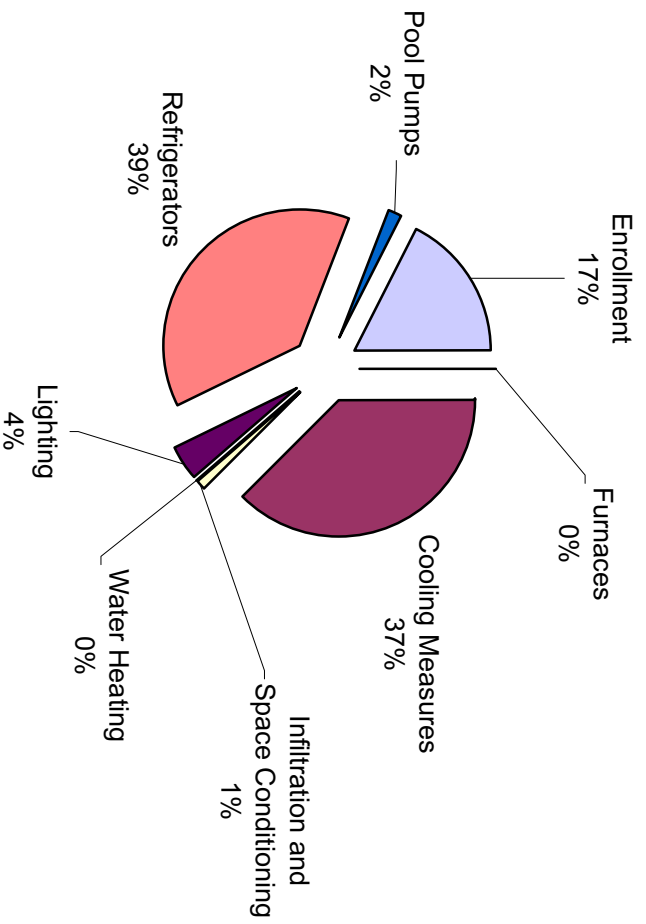
